Message from the Chief Executive Officer

The year we just concluded - the 40th for Self-Help Enterprises - was certainly a remarkable and eventful one for the organization. As we pursue our mission to provide affordable housing and related services to the communities of the San Joaquin Valley, we have been joined in our efforts by our many partners and friends.

We are very pleased to announce that Peter Malloch Ranches donated 40 acres of land in Goshen, Tulare County, with the long-term goal of facilitating development of a 10-acre park for the community of Goshen. Long-time SHE donor Russ Doe made the donation on behalf of the family trust which owns the surrounding land. Having grown up in Goshen, Russ was moved by a desire to do something significant for the children of Goshen. We will be working with the community and our partners at C-SET to bring this dream into reality. The land is located just north of our Goshen Village multifamily housing community.

Another very personal gift is highlighted in the adjoining story about the Doris "Do" Dooley Scholarship Fund.

In addition, the Fannie Mae Foundation and NeighborWorks® have awarded us significant operating support that will allow us to

Former congressman Cal Dooley donates \$50,000 to SHE Scholarship Fund

In December, retiring US Representative Calvin Dooley announced a major contribution to the Self-Help Enterprises Scholarship Fund in honor of his mother, Doris "Do" Dooley. The surprise announcement was made at an event in Fresno honoring Cal's 14 years of service in Congress. No one was more surprised than Do, who was clearly touched by her son's generosity.

The \$50,000 gift was one of several made to local nonprofits from the Congressman's remaining campaign funds. A long-time friend and advocate of SHE, Cal directed the gift to the scholarship fund in recognition of Do's long commitment to the program. As a SHE Board member in the 1980s, Do and her husband Dick hosted a fundraiser at their ranch to initially endow the scholarship, and her interest has continued to this day. The announcement came as a surprise to Do and added to an emotional and touching evening for her.

Joining in recognizing her leadership, the SHE Board recently renamed the fund the Doris "Do" Dooley



Scholarship Fund. Do's passion and commitment were the driving force behind the establishment and growth of our scholarship program for participant families. Congressman Dooley's generous gift is a wonderful way to celebrate and expand her vision.

Housing Rehabilitation and Homebuyer Update

In 2004, the Housing Rehabilitation & Homebuyer staff prepared 32 applications providing cities and counties with \$14,600,000 in state and federal funds. These funds will be used to improve housing and increase homeownership in 13 cities and counties. Staff anticipates the programs, which include home repair, housing reconstruction and home buyer programs, will assist nearly 300 families.

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Emergency Repairs

In the middle of winter, one Hanford senior found herself without heat. The furnace she had come to depend on finally went out. Thanks to our Emergency Repair Fund and a grant by the Bank of America Foundation (Hanford Branch), we were able to replace the furnace.

First Home for First Baby

In August, Mark and Elizabeth Cowdrey became first-time homeowners just in time for their first baby girl. Mark, an assembly technician, and Elizabeth, a teacher's aide, heard about SHE's Homebuyer Assistance Program through a friend. Their daughter, Raylynn Marie, was born as her parents were closing escrow on a two-bedroom, one bath home. The Cowdrevs are one of 131 families SHE has assisted to purchase a home through the Homebuyer Assistance Program that provides down payment and closing cost assistance.

Preparing for a Life Investment: Homeownership Counseling & Education

The series of four classes provides potential homeowners with the knowledge they need to purchase their first homes, including what will be required to maintain it. In 2004, 44 families completed the series that included individualized credit and budget counseling, and "how to" classes on shopping for a lender or a home. The value of these classes is reflected in the referrals received from other organizations throughout the Valley, resulting in more than 300 applicants. In some cases, the series is used to fulfill HUD's 8-hour first time homebuyer education requirement. The Homeownership Counseling & **Education Certification Program is** offered in both English and Spanish with orientation every first Monday evening at our Visalia office. In addition, we partner with Proteus, Ruiz Foods and the Community Action Partnership of Kern to provide similar services.





Youthbuild Partnership Works

In May of 2003, Toui See was expelled from high school for truancy. He was unemployed and felt unmotivated and discouraged. Toui was told he didn't have enough credits to graduate from high school anytime soon – he felt like a diploma was out of reach, even though he wanted to finish.

Then an opportunity arose. In June of 2003, See signed up for Youthbuild, HUD's nation-wide job training program that allows participants to alternate weekly between school and work, learning construction through hands-on training. He is one of the approximately 10 participants currently in the program and he is learning to build quality homes that will later be sold to low-income families.

The local Youthbuild program has been jointly run by Self-Help Enterprises and C-SET, the community action agency of Tulare County, since 1996. According to SHE Vice-President, Tom Collishaw, the partnership is beneficial to both organizations and the youth participants.

"What Self-Help Enterprises is good at is teaching unskilled laborers how to build homes and giving people second chances. C-SET is great at doing outreach to troubled youth, providing education and on-going job training and job placement," Collishaw said.

C-SET applies for the federal Youthbuild grant which pays for all administrative costs associated with running the program and conducts the academic courses for the students. Through the Washburn Construction Loan Fund, SHE provides all the capital involved in the actual construction of the homes.

Communities benefit as much from Youthbuild as the students. The at-

tractive, finished homes are sold to low-income families with assistance often provided by SHE through the First-Time Homebuyers Program.

Youthbuild participants like Toui benefit from the program's unconventional method of education and job training. Most participants, who did not succeed in a traditional academic environment, end up enjoying school with this program.

"It's way better than regular high school," See said. "It's not boring because we are always busy." The Youthbuild classroom structure allows enough time for the students to finish their work during school hours. Toui proudly received his high school diploma in May of 2004 - a goal he did not think he would accomplish just one year before.
