On Monday, December 21, 2009, Dr. Glenda Humiston, USDA Rural Development State Director joined SHE to celebrate with 11 families that had just completed their new homes and prepared to move in. Reedley Mayor Mary Fast and City Manager Rocky Rogers also participated in the ceremony. When complete, the Orchard Estates II subdivision will consist of 44 new self-help homes. The families in each group will spend over 1,500 hours building each other's homes. Congratulations!

Partner Spotlight: Fresno County

The opportunity for 11 Reedley families to move into their new homes before Christmas was made possible by the coordinated efforts of many partners. A key player in the project was the County of Fresno which provided \$371,000 in HOME grant funds to help fund the project. The County



has been an important partner with SHE to help increase and improve the affordable housing options for local low-income families. In addition to helping fund single-family projects, in the last few years, Fresno County has provided \$1.7 million for the construction of 92 affordable, safe, energy-efficient rental homes for hard-working families in Biola and Del Rey. In the last five years alone, Fresno County has directly supported local families through SHE's housing and community development efforts with HOME and CalHome funds totalling nearly \$3.4 million.

The End is the Beginning for Self-Help Builders

The week of Christmas 2009 had special significance for 11 families in Reedley – construction on their homes was over; they were moving in!

Home for the holidays!

Self-Help Enterprises' work was nearing completion with this group of ownerbuilders, and the New Homes staff already moving on to with other work groups. But this end



was really a beginning for each person in these families. Each family labored an average of over 2000 hours since late February to build these eleven homes, through the rains of winter and the furnace blast of summer, to get to this point – the beginning:

• The beginning of family life in a home that they built themselves;



- The beginning of a sense of security and of place that comes from living in a home that they own and can afford;
- The beginning of a homeowner's pride of accomplishment;
- The beginning of creating a place of their own.

They did not get there on their own. Self-Help Enterprises staff walked

with them through every step from completing the loan application to USDA, to learning about escrow instructions and loan closings, to pouring concrete, to building walls and setting trusses, all the way to planting new trees and grass in the front lawns. They also had their new

neighbors to thank – everyone worked on all the

houses – and volunteers who came from near (Reedley Mennonite Church; Provost & Pritchard) and far (Sacramento's Bayside Presbyterian Church; San Jose's Stone Church). Together we made it all the way to the beginning.

Self-Help Enterprises has been a partner to nearly 5,800 families in financing and building new homes since 1965; but it is only a beginning.

Housing Rehabilitation and Homeownership

Because a large portion of the affordable housing available to low-income people in the Valley is older homes, SHE operates a rehabilitation program to preserve and improve the existing stock of housing. SHE also promotes homeownership through our First-Time Homebuyer, Homeownership Counseling & Education, and Foreclosure Counseling programs.

A Foreclosure Counseling Success Story!

Foreclosure counseling can end with a successful outcome for some. One client lost his job and was unable to afford his \$1328/mo payment. After 10 months of working with the client and his lender a final modification was signed which reduced his monthly payment to \$592, including taxes, for 27 years! The loan modification was made possible under the Obama Administration's Making Home Affordable Program.

2009 Community Development Highlights

Community Connections - Working Together to Bring Safe Drinking Water to Valley Residents

The Edmundson Acres water system has unsafe nitrate levels in the drinking water. SHE has worked with the Arvin Community Services District, Edmundson Acres Mutual Water Company and residents to obtain affordable funding to build this project. This project is paid for with federal economic stimulus money (ARRA funds) and State Proposition 84 funds.



Buttonwillow Storage Tank





SHE worked with the community of Buttonwillow to construct a 500,000 gallon welded storage tank. The project was funded by Kern County CDBG and Buttonwillow County Water District.

Technical Assistance Helps Communities Meet their Needs

The Buttonwillow Wastewater Project, a \$2,766,812 endeavor, provided for the replacement of a 50 plus year old wastewater treatment and disposal plant. The project included new lift stations and sewer force main, cleaning and relining of the trunkline, and construction of a new wastewater treatment and disposal plant.

Self-Help Enterprises provided technical assistance and guidance to the project that was funded by a State Small Community Wastewater Grant, a USDA/Rural Development Loan and Grant, and the Buttonwillow County Water District.
